**Explanation of the Boston Project**

Boston played a key role in the beginning of the American Revolution. Many in Boston were angry about new laws being made by England. Others wanted to stay loyal to the king and his army. This anger and frustration on both sides of the argument eventually sparked a revolution. Over the course of three days, you will be gathering information about the causes and beginning of the American Revolution. Each day, you will read an article about an event or events in Boston. After reading each of these, you will answer questions about the differing points of view in each situation. At the end of this assignment, you will become a journalist. You will write an article that details both sides of the argument, as unbiased reporters do.
